Pella Christian's Board of Trustees met for our regular meetings in August and September. The newly combined board began and ended business as we always have, with devotions and prayer. In addition to some personnel matters, minor policy adjustments, and reports from administrators and committees, the board spent the majority of our time on future-oriented, big-picture questions.

How does Pella Christian remain firmly rooted to its biblical and reformed faith while maintaining excellence and relevance for faith formation in the 21st Century? How does Pella Christian respond to the new reality of Education Savings Accounts? How do we, as a non-profit, remain competitive as an employer with the new \$50,000 minimum teacher salary for public school teachers? The board spent time discussing these questions and is working with administration on an updated mission statement to help clarify our direction and guide decision-making.

The board also spent time gathering names for future Trustees. The Nominations Committee hosted a public information session on September 12, 2024. ESAs and Charitable Giving to the Christian School


If you're reading this, it means you're connected to Pella Christian in some way. You understand the power of Christian education, and you can attest to the importance of bringing all of creation under the Lordship of Christ as we raise our children.

You also understand the financial cost involved. lowa public schools spend between \$14,500-\$16,500 per student. Christian schools do it for less, charging tuition to parents and gathering donations from churches and supporters to cover the gap between tuition charged and the true cost of education. Remember that term, the true cost of education.

In 2023, lowa began providing tuition support for students attending non-public schools called Education Savings Accounts (ESAs). In the 2025-2026 every student in Iowa will qualify for at least \$7,826 in tuition support.

Since ESAs became law, I've been asked again and again by supporters, "Is my donation really needed now that we have ESAs?" I can enthusiastically say, yes! Yes it is! Here's why.

Let's say a Christian school's true cost of education is \$13,500 per child. Shown on the graph to the right, the school charges \$10,800 in tuition (blue) and raises an additional \$2,700 per student in donations (yellow) to cover the true cost of education.



When we add ESAs (red), tuition paid by families is less, but donations (yellow) continue to be necessary to cover that true cost. That need will likely rise to cover salary increases to keep teacher pay competitive, cover depreciation costs, and pay for potential expansion.

ESAs are a great blessing for families, but they do not reduce the need for donations from churches and supporters to cover the true cost of education. To ensure our schools exist and thrive for future generations, we need to continue supporting them with the gifts of prayer, engagement, and financial support the way our parents and grandparents did.

August is always an exciting time of year as Fall activities begin even before the school year kicks off. We have over 125 events scheduled for our 7-12th grade students and we are excited to see how students will pursue excellence, develop into servant leaders, cultivate the joy of team and train for kingdom impact through PC activities.

Designating a portion of your assets to a 501c(3) can reduce inheritance taxes and bless future generations.
